All Planning Applications are considered at a full meeting of the Town Council.

There are six appointed members on the burial sub-group who submit recommendations for the full Council's decisions—final decisions made by the full Town Council. Fees are reviewed annually and align with the Church in Wales charges. The Council has a Memorandum of Understanding and does not charge for burials of those under the age of 18.

An appointed Councillor carries out regular health and safety inspections of all assets and one Councillor is appointed to oversee accounting procedures.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION.

An annual audit of accounts and procedures is carried out. A person independent of the Council is appointed as internal auditor annually. They carry out 3 quarterly internal audits and an annual internal audit in April. Wales Audit office then follow on with an external audit of the council. The Council is grateful to the current internal auditor and the Town Clerk for their work.

The Council sets a budget annually which is funded by residents of the community via the Council Tax collected by Powys County Council and paid to the Community Council, known as the precept. Councillors set the precept value when the budget is considered and do everything possible to keep the value to the minimum possible.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2023/2024

On the Verge/Ar yr Ymyl

One of our community environmental groups carry out wild planting in and around Talgarth. Promoting the benefits of biodiversity and educating the future generation.

They have successfully spread their message to other groups around Talgarth and are taking part in Powys County Councils initiative on Biodiversity.

The Town Council fully supports this initiative as it incorporates our vision and commitment to section 6 responsibilities.

The group launched the successful 1-meter matters campaign again with support from TTC which is flourishing and has been embraced by residents.

Our beautiful river Enig bank has been planted with pollinators.







A food triangle formed for community food growing and sharing, Coed Y Bryn orchard, Woodlands community garden and the recently acquired TTC allotment, has all been made possible by successful Powys, Local nature partnership grants.

Woodlands Park Group

Fundraising by Regeneration of Woodlands park group have obtained grants and charitable donations in the region of £27,500, to re furbish the play equipment. The park is certainly enjoying a new lease of life.

Walkers are Welcome

Yet again this year WaW managed to have a sold-out walking festival over the early May bank holiday. This event attracts more and more each year which in turn increases the turnover of our local businesses.

Victorian School Project

Two years ago, T&DRG submitted a bid to PCC under the ARWAIN programme jointly funded by the WG and EU to seek views on refurbishment of our 1875 Victorian School. Views were that the old school should be regenerated in a way that retains a community dimension. Black Mountains College has stepped up as a lead partner and been successful in securing a grant of £1,400,000 from the Community Ownership Fund to reinstate this community building. Special thanks to PCC, Cllr Matthew Dorrance and Fay Jones MP for their backing in this ambitious project.

Tuesday Lunch group

Tuesday Lunch Club continues to go from strength to strength. This is a well needed asset to the community and TTC continue to provide free rental of the Town Hall to assist the group with ever spiralling costs of living.

Christmas Lights

The Christmas lights event 2023 was another success, huge thanks and congratulations to the Lights team, Festival Group and Grow For Talgarth

The former Church Hall is now known as the Community Hall, now run by local charity trustees, Tony James and Doris James. The Council wish to thank them both for their commitment and hard work in developing this valuable community asset.

August 2023 saw another fantastic bank holiday festival organised by the Festival Group who continue to bring vibrancy to our town attracting residents and visitors alike.

Grow For Talgarth

GfT continue in the efforts in keeping in the town looking vibrant. Thank you to all your volunteers for their hard work, commitment in keeping the town looking vibrant.

Dyfed Powys Police

The Town Council works closely with Dyfed Powys Police (DPP) Community Support Officers on any issues that arise in the community.

A monthly PCSO surgery happens in the committee room for residents to attend to discuss any matters of concern.

They are engaged in training and assisting members of the Community Speed Watch (CSW) team in a constant bid to deal with prevention of speeding vehicles in the community. DPP resources and budgets mean that they are limited in how much time they can spend enforcing speed limits, so we encourage residents to come forward and join the CSW team.

Annual Act of Remembrance

Following our annual act of Remembrance 2023 a tea was held at the town hall. The hall had been decorated with the help from local volunteers and the whole community came together to remember those fallen in conflict and those still suffering.



This year, 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D Day on 6th June. The Council will work with the community to support commemorative events.

6th June at 11:00 hrs there will be a wreath laying accompanied by a lone piper and bugler. At 21:15 hrs 6th June there will be singing by Talgarth Male Voice Choir and the lighting of the beacon. Saturday 8th June there will be road closures in the Square for a day of commemorative activities for the community.

Policies

The Council has limited legal powers to operate as a corporate body and has several policies to comply with, which are reviewed annually. These include Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, General Data Protection Regulations/Security & Confidential, Complaints, Freedom of Information, Financial and Management Risk assessments, Insurance and Councillor Code of Conduct, Equality and diversity.

All councillors have completed a personal training needs analysis. Our deputy mayor has now submitted our on-going training needs plan.

Biodiversity Plan

ENVIRONMENT (WALES) ACT 2016 PART 1 – SECTION 6

THE BIO-DIVERSITY AND RESILIENCE OF ECOSYSTEMS DUTY

It is now the duty of the council to plan yearly to meet the above requirement.

Moving forward a subgroup of councillors will need to scope and formulate a plan for coming years. This would involve our various community groups who will also have to incorporate this act in any future planning.

The Council manages sites that are ideally suitable for the development of bio-diversity initiatives as follows:

St Gwendoline's Churchyard

King George V Playing fields/Pavilion/Children's Play area/Tennis Courts

Bowling Club House/Green

The Town Hall

Swift boxes have been placed around the town hall to encourage these migrant visitors. This was suggested by a local resident and member of the Brecon and District Swift group, and we thank them for pursuing this.

PCC have been advised to please not use herbicides/fungicides and pesticides on our town's verges and pavements this is supported by On the Verge, Grow for Talgarth and Black Mountains College. The PCC have accepted this request and for the short term no pesticides shall be used.

As cited previously TTC have agreed to pay the yearly rental for a community allotment. Work has started on the plot and vegetables are already growing.



Statement Going Forward.

The Town Council aims to continue to represent the views of residents on differing topics and where possible provide services to meet local needs, to support and develop any initiatives to enhance our community life and the well-being of our residents now and for future generations.

As a council we need to look more at sustainable energy projects, Emergency planning for the town and the cost of living crisis.

There has been much disquiet about parking in our town square and surrounding roads, we shall looking at a whole town parking review in the next financial year.

Compliance with any new legislation will be actioned and the development of the required training plans will be completed.

Community engagement and participation by Town Councillors will continue as always. This will be achieved by Councillors being part of community life, being visible and attending community group meetings.

We will continue to work with our partners Powys County Council and BBNPA. The Town Council continue to work alongside County Councillor William Powell to ensure optimum outcomes for the residents of Talgarth.
